

With Easter fast approaching, and having given you recipes for Hot Cross Buns and Easter nest cakes in previous years, a recipe for Simnel cake seems appropriate this year. Although it is seen as an Easter tradition nowadays, it was eaten on Mothering Sunday in years gone by. With food stocks getting low, a high calorie Simnel cake provided useful nutrition.

Simnel cake is a light fruit cake distinguished by a layer of marzipan in the middle of the cake and another one on top. Traditionally it is decorated with 11 marzipan balls to represent Jesus' 12 apostles minus Judas who betrayed him, although for symmetry and to help with slicing, you can add a twelfth ball to represent Jesus, or replace the marzipan balls with Mini Eggs. One important detail to note is that shop-bought marzipan is too firm for this recipe, although you could make half the quantity of almond paste for the centre and use shop-bought for the top, especially if you have concerns about eating uncooked egg.

SIMNEL CAKE

Ingredients

For the almond paste: 250 g (8 oz) ground almonds 250 g (8 oz) caster sugar 1 egg, beaten 2 drops of almond essence

For the cake:

150 g (5 oz) butter at room temperature 150 g (5 oz) soft brown sugar 2 eggs at room temperature 150 g (5 oz) plain flour ½ tsp baking powder 1 tsp ground mixed spice 125 g (4oz) sultanas 175 g (6 oz) currants Or 350 g (12 oz) mixed fruit 50 g (2 oz) mixed peel) Juice of 1 orange



To finish: 50 g (2 oz) Apricot jam, warmed and sieved (as if I ever sieve it!) A little beaten egg

If you have time and remember, soak the fruit in the orange juice in the fridge the night before you make the cake.

- 1. Line a 7" round deep cake tin with baking parchment, or other suitable non-stick paper. Set the oven to 180C.
- 2. Start by making the almond paste. Mix the ground almonds and sugar together in a bowl, add the egg and almond essence and mix to form a stiff paste. Put to one side while you make the cake.
- 3. Beat the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy, then gradually add the eggs one by one, beating well between each addition.
- 4. Sift the flour, baking powder and spice together and fold lightly into the mixture. Add the dried fruit and orange juice and fold in gently until evenly distributed.
- 5. Weigh 500g (1 lb) of the mixture and place into the prepared tin. Smooth the surface.
- 6. Take half of the almond paste and roll into a circle to fit the tin. Place it on top of the cake mixture in the tin. Cover the marzipan with the remaining cake mixture and smooth the surface.
- 7. Bake in the preheated oven for 1 hour 20 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the cake centre comes out clean. Leave in the tin to cool.
- 8. When cool, turn the cake out of tin and brush the top of the cake with the warm jam. Halve the remaining almond paste and roll one half to make a thin disc to cover the cake, then use the remaining to make 11 balls. Place the disc over the jam and stick the balls on with a little of the jam.
- 9. Turn your grill on to its highest setting. Brush the almond paste with the beaten egg and grill until the top is slightly brown.

We thought we'd moved to a sleepy little village, when boom at 3am there's loud cracks, bangs and flashes of light outside. Literally the whole room would light up for a split second then we'd be plunged back into darkness, with the sound of deafening bangs. I thought the whole of the front of the house was on fire!

Wasn't sure whether to look out or not. We gingerly opened the curtains to see the pole a flame with what looked like a giant firework exploding at the top! We called the fire brigade, think most of the village did, thank goodness.

We were worried that the wires might burn through and drop onto our neighbours house. We couldn't walk round the front due to all the sparks so then we thought maybe we should hop over the 4 fences at the back to see if they wanted to come to ours, luckily the fire brigade arrived at that point so we didn't have to face the obstacle course of barbed wire. We've now swapped numbers just in case we have any more exciting end of the world events! Like us they'd never seen anything like this, however, we've subsequently heard it's quite a regular occurrence in Oxhill.

So watch out for those old pylons, you never know when they might go boom! Like our neighbours we were all kitted ready to escape out the back if need be. My hubby went outside sporting quite a combo of sunnies and dressing gown to check if it was a distraction tactic to steal anyone's oil, pretty extravagant tactics I thought! While I went to check on our bear of a dog Diesel who reassuringly wasn't bothered at all by the noise but was more upset about not being allowed out to meet everyone gathering out the front. It really was quite a show, should have sold tickets!

On a recent trip to London, I saw a theatre poster advertising a production of Harper Lee's 'To Kill a Mockingbird'. It brought to mind seeing these wonderful birds on holiday some years ago. It also got me thinking that despite the fact that many, many people here will have read this wonderful book, few would know much about these birds - let alone

what they look like - as they are not native to the UK

Mockingbirds are about the size of a thrush and there are about 17 species. They are only found in the Americas although there have been a few sightings in the UK, the most recent two years ago in Devon. They are well known for being great mimics, particularly of other birds but also of insects. It's believed this is how they earned their name.

The photograph is of a Northern Mockingbird and was taken in Cuba in 2012.

While trawling through Ann Hales's notes, I found the attached which I thought made quite interesting reading. I assume Ann must have transcribed it from the original in the Record Office in Warwick. It would have been written by the Oxhill School headmistress, Dorothy Unett; in a separate note Ann's written:

"Jan 29th 1942 I Dorothy C.E. Unett have today resigned my post as Head Mistress of this school."

(This after many entries of complaint about unemptied lavatories about which she was tired of writing to the Managers: about pipes continually bursting; about repairs and maintenance left undone; also succession of petty pilferings from locked cupboards in the school).

- Oct 2 The three evacuees from Middlesex were fetched back by their parents today. The children had been quite happy but the mothers were miserable without them.
- Oct 19 Dentist examined all 12 children but one baby who was asleep.

Jun 20 Have asked the caretaker to keep the screen back during these days of air raids as there is so much glass in it.

The remains of the stained glass in a window in the chancel of Whatcote Church, which was damaged by bombing in the Second World War.

Jun 21 Have stopped blowing the whistle and ringing the school bell for Assembly but the result has been several children late each session.

Jul 1 Admitted three more voluntary evacuees. Number on roll is now 18.

Jul 10 On instruction from the Director I turned out all old registers and unimportant records (over 3 years old) and send them to be re-pulped for paper-making. Some of the records dated back to 1874. Have kept a few for historical reference.

The usual summer holidays are to be cancelled. The Managers have decided to close the School from Friday, August 2 to Monday August 19th for a rest period only.

Jul 23 Among the old papers sent for re-pulping we are asked from the Director not to destroy important records (including Form 9E of past years). Have taken care to obey these instructions.

Jul 12

Aug 21	cloakroom so that we can have an emergency shelter in case of a sudden raid. Have put it up myself pending the arrival of the builders and the regulation linen tape.
Sep 9	Admitted 2 more voluntary evacuees. Number on the roll is now 23.
Sep 14	Received two rolls of linen tape from the County Office for protection of school windows. Sent the same to Mr. Groves who is superintendent of the work.
Sep 19	Mr Quinton's men came to fix linen tape on school windows as a protection against air raids.
Nov 4	Opened school with roll of 23. An assistant teacher started work to help. Have put the big glass screen across to divide the school into 2 rooms. Have asked Mr. Groves to have this screen fitted with adhesive tape like the windows have been in case of air raids.
Nov 11	The adhesive tape has been fitted to the screen. Six more children admitted. The number on the roll is now 29.
Nov 21	The Air Raid Wardens have grumbled about the caretaker using a light here in the early mornings, so we are to alter the time of morning Assembly to 9.30 from next Monday, November 25th.
Dec 2	A group of evacuee boys from Coventry (Broad St. School) arrived unexpectedly tonight with a male teacher, Mr. Williams.
Dec 3	Just for the time being have borrowed forms and whist drive tables for the evacuees. Mrs. Valender has offered the use of the Wesleyan schoolroom as we are overcrowded.

3 bombs were dropped in a field about 50 yds from the school. Several sheep were killed, and windows and roofs of houses shattered. The school windows were slightly cracked and some plaster fell. Whatcote church was destroyed and there were 10 other bombs dropped in the district with no

The Coventry boys are well behaved during lesson time with Mr. Williams but very troublesome in the cloakroom and the playground. I have had to complain about scribbling on classroom walls, throwing broken glass about in the playground, and general rowdyism. However when the usual routine of lessons is resumed they will probably settle down. During these 2 weeks, Mr Williams has only taken Arithmetic and English with them, with no P.T. or organised games to use up animal spirits.

Dec 18 Parents Day This afternoon about 50 parents and friends came to share in a short entertainment given by the children. Songs, poems, a sketch and carols were given by Oxhill children, and popular song-choruses by the Coventry boys. Everyone seemed to enjoy it and the Vicar gave a vote of thanks.

Dec 20 Closed school for Christmas holidays. The Oxhill children are to have a fortnight and the evacuees a week. During the 2nd week Mr. Williams and myself will share duties in having the Coventry boys at school for reading and games to relieve the foster mothers of extra strain.

Oct 10	Have obtained a Milk Permit under the Milk in Schools Scheme for 6 gallons 2 pints of milk daily from Mr. W. Clifton, Greenhill Farm, Oxhill				

Dec 11 Received 40 extra clothing coupons for Albert Harper who is 5' 10" (13 years old) and Arnold Vale (12 years old) who is 5' 3".

Maintenance

Maintenance never stops and in the hall trustees committee meeting this month we reviewed the long list of items that need to be done to keep the hall in good order for the benefit of the local community. This is an expensive number of items, including: replacement gas heater; stage curtain system; re-decoration; kitchen boiler; chairs and tables; several areas requiring refurbishment; and roof repairs (not including the main hall flat roof – currently ok, but a very worrying prospect when it needs replacing). And, like us all, we're looking at a shocking renewal for the electricity contract.

Thank you for your continued support – there's a common misconception that we're the "Town Hall" and therefore a council building that our council tax bills fund – this isn't the case, although we're very grateful when we receive a council grant for one of the many items requiring attention. We're very dependent on hiring fees, donations, and proceeds from the Traditional Jazz events we put on. On that front, it was very encouraging to see a sell-out for our event in February. As reported before, the proceeds from these are currently focused on one of our projects, providing "access for all" to the stage with a stage lift, and it's great to report that we're getting close to achieving the funding required. With prices increasing, we're in negotiation to get the best deal possible and hope to report soon that this has got the go-ahead.

On the jazz front, at the time of writing, tickets for Tom "Spats" Langhams's Hot Fingers are selling very well and we're anticipating another sell-out, which is great news. Next up, we have the fabulous King Pleasure and the Biscuit Boys on Friday 21st April. Tickets are £15, available from www.ticketsource.co.uk/townsend-hall, where you can bag your own table and seating, or for general availability seating from Clarke Electrical Services in town.
