
## THANK YOU TO THE OXHILL NEWS COURIERS

#### THE BEGINNING OF THE LOCKMASTER CANAL MAPS

In 1972 Doug Smith and I moved into a semi derelict, barrel roofed lock cottage on the Stratford canal in Rowington. Mains water was installed while we were on our honeymoon which saved us from having a waterfall in the hall every time we filled the water tank in the








loft. This came from the stream which ran through the garden and the overflow pipe was a smaller diameter than the input!


Doug was a self-employed land surveyor and within weeks had a job for the M40 in the field opposite – not picked up on the searches when we bought the cottage!!! Then in 1974, just after the birth of our daughter Jackie - all of his work dried up with the onset of the oil crisis which brought motorway building to a halt. In an effort to keep hold of the cottage which we loved, we started to sell anything possible to the passing canal traffic. If we sold 120 bread rolls a day (Doug would get up at 6.00 am to get the first batch started) we covered the mortgage, then sales of cakes and home grown veg added to the coffers. Doug knew the canals inside out so added canal books to our sales. I taught myself to paint the traditional roses and castles then anything that passed under our noses got decorated and the empty Heinz baby food tins became miniature painted Buckby cans !!!

As the southern Stratford canal had only recently been restored for navigation, I suggested Doug drew a map of it. That sparked his imagination and Lockmaster Maps was founded. The first map – The Avon



Ring – was drawn at 1" to the mile but we soon found that it was too large for practical use so the following maps were drawn at that scale but reduced to half the scale for sale. Each map was put into a plastic sleeve (an incredibly tedious job for which we eventually employed several of our friend's children) and sold flat. It was very exciting every time he returned home with news of the day's sales as boatyards reacted very favourably to them.

Doug took on a surveying job for the local council to keep us afloat but as he increased the number of maps and sales grew, he needed to devote more time to them. However, giving up



the council job was scary as there was a financial shortfall. To cover this we started up a private hire taxi service. Oh boy!!! We had two children by now and were still running the shop from the cottage selling more and more canal inspired goodies. I was painting a lot of different things, lanterns, wooden stalls, cans etc. and we had added postcards, tea towels, pottery, playing cards, coasters etc with our own designs most of which Doug also wholesaled. If he was out selling and we got a call for the cab, I would shut the shop putting a 'Back Later' sign up, fit the children into the taxi and go and do the run. Doug's father

loaned us the money to buy a black cab and Doug fitted a seat for the children in the front luggage hold (I can't think that would pass safety rules now). The cottage loft no longer became large enough to store everything so we bought two obsolete British Rail carriages as warehouses. One of these had been a gunpowder wagon so as Doug renovated it little rivers of flame would go ahead of the blow torch!!! The passenger wagon had to be lined out for insulation and eventually I moved into a part of this to do the painted ware.

Doug went on to survey the whole of the UK's inland waterways system on his bicycle, taking notes of locks, bridges, amenities, shops and public houses along the way. On his return to Kingswood Cottage he would meticulously draw each map by hand using Rotring pens to define the routes he'd travelled, hand drawing every detail and hand writing every place name using his calligraphy skills.

We divorced in 1991 but he stayed in the cottage and ran the business as long as he was able. It was then sold to other canal wholesalers.

In 2019, our son Rob was offered the chance to take back the map business and he has started to revise them digitally. It is lovely that it has returned to the family and that he has the skills and desire to carry it on.

And the fun continues!!! Last year Rob was approached by a Birmingham based distillers to see if they could use the Black Country canal map on their new bottles – originally B RUM but as the range of drinks has expanded so the name has been changed to WMD (West Midlands Distillers). The bottle for the black spiced rum is dramatic.



NB. The Editor (Poor Soul) would like to start a letters to the Editor column. This has, in fact, been requested, but unfortunately she never gets any. How can she start such a column without help. Would you care to write a 'Letter to the Editor' - even a rude one?.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. (Yes - I actually had one).

From Nom de Guerre, of Warwick Road, Stratford upon Avon.

Dear Editor - Your invitation for correspondents is irresistable, particularly since you set no parochial limits. As one who passes through your village regularly and can claim some local knowledge, I wonder what sort of people you really are in Oxhill. On the first page of the July issue is a long moan from the Parish Council about little bins, substandard water supply and incompleted bridge works, followed by a plea on behalf of the Village Hall, whose committee are apparently trying, against odds, to make the place habitable.

Then on page two we read the underlying reproach to the majority of your parishioners who ignore their lovely old Church and the energies of the few who maintain it.

On page three the militants really get going with more noise about rate injustices than is heard from many a large community.

Then to crown it all, on page four is the scrap of complacent nonsense trying to show a completely different picture. Either there are two factions in Oxhill, neither knowing how the other half lives, or somebody is getting at you for your smug self satisfaction.

Dear Nom de Guerre. - I am delighted to receive your letter. It is the first I have ever had in this capacity! I must answer your points in order. Firstly, a factual report of a Parish Council meeting does not, in my opinion, constitute a 'moan'.
