First Aid in Oxhill

Dear Editor

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself. I am Mick Shepard of 3 The Leys Oxhill. I came here to live with Barbara Peach last July.

For many years Barbara and I have been involved in Motor Sport, which is where we have acquired our First Aid experience. We currently have the same qualifications, which are First Aid at Work, Emergency Aid, Appointed Persons, NHS Oxygen and Entonox. We also are trained in extricating injured persons from cars and the use of spinal extrication devices eg, collars and Keds.

We have recently completed a Defribulator course and, in association with Warwickshire Ambulance Service, hope to be able to offer a First Responder Service at some time in the future.

The First Responder Service is set up to try to improve the chance of survival if someone suffers a Heart Attack, by getting a trained person with a Defribulator to them as quickly as possible. In rural areas like this it could take an Ambulance 30 to 40 minutes to arrive. This is where the First Responder would be able to attend more quickly and provide life saving treatment and care until the ambulance arrives. This is particularly important as when a person has suffered a heart attack and they have stopped breathing there is only a matter of a few minutes in which it is possible to try restarting the heart before oxygen starvation to the brain has taken place. Although we have a lot of First Aid Kit we do not yet have a defribulator, which costs about £2500 plus.

I will be writing to you when I have further information.

We successfully raised £2,600 to trigger the anonymous £10,000 donation. Our grateful thanks to all who contributed and especially our anonymous donor for their support, which is much appreciated. The outside has been re-pointed and the gable ends repaired to prevent further erosion and damage. Closure of Oxhill Methodist Church

I was sorry to hear of the closure of Oxhill Methodist Church due to happen this month, and people may perhaps like to know a little of its long history.

For over 200 years Methodism has played an important part in Oxhill life, from the first meeting which was held at Oxhill House the home of John Ward, in 1769, at which the preacher was Rev. John Pawson, a leading Wesleyan later to become Conference President. The movement in Oxhill was founded by William Geden, a tailor from Tysoe, where there was already a similar small Society. For thirty years, (and latterly when he was over seventy) Mr. Geden walked, stout stick in one hand, lantern in the other, across the open fields to Oxhill to hold Sunday evening services and again to a class meeting during the week.

The Ward family of Oxhill House, where the meetings were first held, were affluent fanners - like the Archers of Ambridge they seemed to own half the village and several of the larger houses! However unlike the Archers - (are there any Methodists in Ambridge?) - they were devout Methodists, and great benefactors to the movement in Oxhill. In 1814 John Ward donated the land for a chapel, which was built at a cost of £287.19s.2½d. The congregation grew, and in 1839 the building was enlarged, and a gallery added.

In 1877 there were said to be "100 regular hearers", but the chapel building itself was becoming dilapidated, and there were complaints of damp and draughts. In 1878 considerable improvements took place, the gallery was removed, and a transept added, together with a schoolroom for the flourishing Sunday School. At the reopening services there were six preachers!

The Chapel Centenary in 1914 was marked with special services held over two days, when the congregations were large. In 1989 the 175th anniversary was also celebrated, but by now the regular congregation was dwindling. Mr. Harold Law, to whose research in the 1980s I am indebted, noted that the village had changed, its population was lower than in the 1880s, and few of the old families, whose parents and grandparents had connections with Oxhill Chapel, now remained. Rev Dr. David F. Clarke, Superintendent of the Kineton Circuit writing in 1990, commented that nevertheless, in the years between John Pawson's visit to Oxhill in 1769 and that of a later Conference President in the 1980s, "Methodism has done a great thing nationally; and it is as well to remember that the national effect is only a product of the witness of the Oxhills of this life"

We shall miss the presence of Oxhill Methodist Church, and the contribution it has made over many years to the life of our village.

Nature notes for June

June: The midsummer month named after Juno, the great Roman goddess of the moon, of women, and of childbirth.

Summer is well and truly here and the countryside is an exuberant carpet of green. Wildflowers are springing up and fledglings abound. I mentioned some months ago the small flock of long-tailed tits visiting our nut-hanger, but the other morning as I was crossing the footbridge to the long meadow behind the church, I became aware of boisterous bird chitter-chatter and realised I was in the middle of a small flock of these delightful birds feeding their first flight of fledglings. I counted five fledglings and approximately eight to ten adults, who ignored me as they dashed backwards and forwards feeding their young. They were so close that I could have touched them, and one fledgling was not more than 12 inches from my head. They are the daintiest of the tit family, the adults being no more than the size of a golf ball, but the fledglings were no larger than a spherical ten pence piece with a long tail sprouting from the back. They build a beautiful nest of a globe of feathers, moss, fur and any other soft material with a tiny entrance hole, all bound together with cobwebs and covered with lichen. In Warwickshire in the 1920s and 30s these were known as Bum Barrel's nests, the Bum Barrel being a local name for this pretty little bird, along with Buttermilk Can!

June is probably the best month for wildflowers and one of my passions is for orchids. Unfortunately this part of Warwickshire is not a good spot for orchids, so I sometimes go to Oxfordshire and Berkshire to see them. However, if you go up Lady Elizabeth's hill out of Tysoe towards Epwell, half way up on the left-hand bend there is a large piece of verge (with the road salt barrel on it) and by mid June you can see a large group of Common Spotted Orchids. As the name suggests, it is the commonest of the wild orchids, but nevertheless a real treat to see.

June 21st is the Summer Solstice and the longest day of the year. Seek out St John's Wort against Midsummer Eve (June 23rd) whose night is one of the most uncanny and dangerous of the year! "The virtue of St John's Wort is this, if it be put in a man's house, there shall come no wicked spirite therein" – Bauckes Herbal, 1525.
