Is the Feast day of Saint Theodota and her Three Sons, and also of Saints Eusebius of Vercelli, Plegmund, Stephen I (Pope), Syagrius of Autun, and Sidwell (aka Sativola). This seems an unusually small number of Saints for one day, though I suppose the three sons help to make up for it a little. I have no idea why the three sons are included.

It was the day in 1718 when Britain, France, Austria, and Holland concluded the Quadruple Alliance against Spain, in an attempt to prevent Spain from annexing Sardinia and Sicily, and in 1858 when the British Government took over the ruling of India from the East India Company. In 1875 Britain's first roller-skating rink was opened to the public, in Belgravia, London, and in 1894 Death duties, now known as Inheritance tax, were introduced in Britain. In 1945 the Potsdam Conference, establishing the initial post war treatment of Germany and demanding unconditional Japanese surrender, ended, and in 1993, following speculative pressure on currencies in the European Exchange Rate Mechanism, the Mechanism collapsed and currencies were allowed to fluctuate within broad band of 15% on either side of central rates.

People born on the second of August include John Tyndall in 1820, Ethel M Dell in 1881, Arthur Bliss in 1891, Peter O'Toole in 1931 and Sammy McIlroy in 1954.

Those dying include Thomas Gainsborough in 1788, Jacques Etienne Montgolfier in 1799, Enrico Caruso in 1921, Louis Blériot in 1936 and William S. Burroughs in 1997. The S is for Seward. Not many people know that, and even fewer care.

Letter to the Editor

Hello George,

As a temporary resident of Oxhill I wanted to let you know I was very impressed with the Scarecrow weekend, even more so when I found out this was the first such event that had been held here. I did at least 2 tours of the village and photographed every display I found. Some question was raised in the newsletter, received today, as to just how many scarecrows were in fact on display, so here is my analysis taken from my pictures.

I counted a total of 67 displays, some of course contained multiple scarecrows, such as the wedding (10) and the orchestra (5)

In the displays I counted a total of 88 genuine scarecrows, with an additional 16 other items that were imaginative and entertaining, but not exactly my idea of a scarecrow..

To qualify to be counted as a scarecrow, the item had to be capable of being used for that purpose, in other words it had to resemble a human form and be complete with all limbs, (long skirts accepted) a torso and a head. It also had to be of human size. (I did include children sized scarecrows, after all the real thing can often be more scary than the adult!).

This of course excluded some of the more imaginative displays, such as "Beechers Brook", the Dalek and the snowman from being included in my scarecrow count. Doll-like and manufactured items were not counted at all.

I have to congratulate the people of the village for doing such a splendid job, and I am happy for them that they raised a significant sum as a result.

By the way, my pictures have been emailed to friends and relatives as far away as Seattle and Detroit in the USA, and Cairns in Australia.

NATURE NOTES FOR AUGUST

In Gaelic *An Lugnasda* – the month of Lammas festival.

Firstly, let me thank my good friend and neighbour Old Muckraker for standing in for me while I was on holiday. By golly he does see some strange things.

Fantastic news for Oxhill. We have had a Barn owl successfully rear one (or maybe two?) young in the roof of our church. The congregation have been very aware of this as the young Barn owl in its cry for food makes quite a fearsome hissing noise. If you ever hear this noise coming from inside a hollow tree (their usual nesting site) it will send quite a shiver up your spine. At dusk we watched as the adult returned with food, but it was cautious and sat on the church roof for some minutes before entering to feed the young. While the adult was away, the hissing would continue and occasionally a white face would lean out to look round, and although we were very quiet and still, it would spot us and duck back in. The adult birds have been seen during the day hunting the fields around the village. The Barn owl population in Britain has dropped dramatically in recent years from an estimated 12,000 pairs at the beginning of the 20th century. The British Trust for Ornithology and The Owl Trust have been looking into this drop in numbers and the loss of old barns and farmyards is certainly one of the contributing factors. However, at a national meeting in 2000, the Barn owl was said to have been "pulled back from the brink of extinction". By the time you read this the young will have flown, and of course the nesting site is protected by law. We now have at least five birds of prey nesting and breeding within our parish boundary, tawny owl, barn owl, kestrel, sparrowhawk and buzzard.

Last month while walking at the bottom of Manor Lane very early one morning I surprised from the hedge a Hobby (Falco subbuteo), which is a summer visitor to Britain (although I believe that some do stay through the winter now). About kestrel size, it is dark grey above and pale underneath and has a shorter tail than a kestrel. In flight it has sickle-shaped wings and looks like a large swift. It will prey on swallows and martins but also takes large insects. It used to be one of Britain's rarest birds of prey, but in recent years it appears to be on the increase. It used only to be seen in open countryside close to woodlands, but there are now reports of them from all sorts of countryside. As a prelude to hunting, the hobby will sit in a hedge or a tree (it is sometimes known as a Tree falcon) and will then take off and fly about in an apparently casual fashion. Then with extreme suddenness and speed it will streak forward like a bolt from a bow into a flock of swallows or martins to make its kill. A friend of mine says he has seen, in their breeding season, hobbies exchanging the "kill" while in flight; presumably the more successful hunter carries on hunting while the partner feeds.

As this particular hobby took off from the hedge I watched over the top of the hedge as it flew straight and fast across the next stubble field, and as it passed, several lapwings rose into the air giving alarm cries. The hobby ignored them and flew on and the lapwings settled down again. I observed the lapwings over the next few days and saw three pairs nesting on the open stubble. I could see at least one young bird. One morning as I watched, a pair of crows flew over and then returned and settled on the ground close to one nest. Instantly all six adult lapwings appeared and started the most amazing "aerial bombardment" of the crows – on some dives I could actually hear the lapwings hitting the crows. The crows quickly got fed up with this and flew away. Unfortunately a few days after this encounter the field was sprayed and ploughed – I hope there were no eggs left and any young offspring were able to make an escape, especially as I haven't seen lapwings nesting around Oxhill for many years.

On August 9th observe the Harvest Moon: "The moon doth always piss when she is pale, when red she farts: when white, she wipes her tail. Countrymen observe as a certain rule, that a dripping moon (that is, perpendicular) presages wet, especially the moon being of a cloudy and blackish colour in a clear sky; and that the weather will last so a good while". – Aubrey "Observations" c. 1865.

August 10th is our own St Lawrence's Day, the Cooks' festival. "On this day in 1787 died at Bolton in Lancashire the Reverend Richard Godwin of Gateacre. His death is supposed to have been occasioned by eating too large a quantity of Plums, the preceding day, after dinner" – The Derby Mercury, 1787.

NOTES OF A MEETING OF OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON TUESDAY 12thJuly 2005 AT 8.00 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Apologies were received from Stephen Hackett. All other Councillors were present. The meeting was attended by Sergt. Warren Ayres and District Councillor Isobel Seccombe, and a substantial number of households were also represented.

MATTERS DISCUSSED

Anti-social behaviour

David Hill, Chairman, outlined the position to-date regarding anti-social behaviour in the village and said that the Police were largely aware of the situation. Following debate and information from the meeting, Sergt. Warren Ayres clarified the following:

The legal position with regard to small uninsured motorbikes on the highway involved in an accident is treated under the Road Traffic Act and where no insurance is held compensation through the courts can be pursued. Decisions are still awaited on how to deal with this type of vehicle under the Law.

Noise nuisance, whether it be loud music, vehicle noise or any other persistent noise nuisance, should be recorded with Date, Duration, Name of those offending, and sent to the Environmental Dept. Stratford District Council.

Threatening behaviour from any individual should be reported to the Police and a record kept of the incident giving Date, Time, What occurred, Who did it, Witnesses.

It was stressed by Sergt. Warren Ayres the importance of recording any anti-social incident. If there are witnesses their names and addresses should also be recorded. The Police had produced a format for recording incidents headed, "Incident Diary" and copies of this were available. Input from the community is extremely important in gathering information. When the Law is broken the Police need correct and detailed information to enable them to bring a successful prosecution when necessary. (A form suitable for recording such incidents has been folded into the middle of this issue of the News. Ed)

There was much debate and a real concern from the meeting. The fear of what might happen was as important a factor as the incidents that had occurred. 4 crimes and 2 anti-social incidents for Oxhill had been recorded in the last 3 months. These statistics were refuted by the meeting as many more incidents had been reported to the Police. Sergt. Warren Ayres agreed to look into this.

Isobel Seccombe, District Councillor informed the meeting that Social Services, Child Support Groups along with the Police and Environmental Departments all worked closely together to find the best solutions to acts of anti-social behaviour for all the parties involved.

David Hill thanked the many people who had come along to the meeting and Sergt. Warren Ayres for giving his free time to attend, and stressed the importance of keeping the "Incidents Diary" and passing on the information to the Police. All information is treated in the strictest confidence.

WIREPORT - JULY 2005

As our President was not able to attend, the Vice President, Pam McLeod, chaired the meeting, starting at 7.30pm. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and other business that had been received from Warwick office was also read. A letter had been received from Sue Westmacott of the Caravan Club, praising the efforts of the ladies who had hosted the evening meal for them on such a hot day and evening. There will not be a meeting in August, but our President will be hosting a garden party, open to all members. It was also agreed that we would carry on the "shoebox appeal", further details of this would be announced at a later meeting. All members agreed that they thought this was a very worthwhile project.

Our Queen is the Sovereign head of the Order, and St John the Baptist is the Patron Saint. There were many and varied questions from the audience, one of which was that the Order had recognised a need in the community and is now starting homes for the elderly, where the carers are St John's volunteers. These homes have escalated over the last five years as private homes were being closed down. Major Parnham has retired from active duty to St John's due to ill health, but still gives talks to interested parties and is still very keen to help the organisation in any way he could. He was one of the best speakers we have had, very informative and down to earth and knew how to keep an audience spellbound.

Kath Silman, as hostess for the evening, gave the vote of thanks to Major Parnham, also giving us some anecdotes of her own perspective of the Order. Shirley Pilkington and Jackie Batchelor served refreshments, with the valuable help of Belinda Keep.
