Oxhill Celebrated on June 2nd, 3rd and 4th, 2022!

Wow, what a party we had in Oxhill to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, actually more like three parties! It was absolutely fantastic to see so many of Oxhill's residents

joining in with the celebrations, whether they had lived in the village for most of the Queen's reign or moved in a fortnight beforehand.

A small team of people started planning the event in August last year but, with great foresight, Mike Collins had provisionally booked a marquee back in the first lockdown in 2020. During the early planning meetings, we realised we needed to know if the village wanted to celebrate the Jubilee, so we sent out a questionnaire. Thank you to all the questionnaire collectors who later became ticket money collectors. Fortunately, the response was positive, although numbers were low but the Parish Council offered support once we submitted a budget and outline plan. Thank you, Parish Council!

Janet and Nick Gardner very kindly agreed to the marquee being placed on their field



and Colin and Jill Tucker let us use the Old Chapel and its services at no charge. Without these facilities there would have been no event, so a massive thank you is sent to Jill, Colin, Janet and Nick.

When the team first discussed having a beacon, Kirby Farm was the natural position for it, within easy walking distance of Oxhill and high enough to be visible from other beacons. Not only did Thomas Fox agree to the plan but he arranged the beacon building and necessary safety measures. Thank you for all your help and support, Thomas! We were also treated to

a last-minute piper and the choir singing the Song of the Commonwealth. Thank you to William Morris for piping and Jill Tucker for organising the choir.

Feeding 300 people requires a huge quantity of food which needs to be kept chilled so we hired a refrigerated trailer. Hugh Rowse happily and kindly accommodated the trailer and also powered it at his own expense. Thank you, Hugh! We also needed a Decorating Team, which Lynsey Cleaver took on willingly, until she heard the budget we thought we could give her. The assembled crowd enjoyed watching Joe shear the sheep. Thank you to Shaun and Joe for bringing the sheep and their expertise.

Iain Macpherson ran an enjoyable children's disco before dinner. After dinner, he set a very entertaining quiz, and then hosted an evening of "Has Oxhill got Talent". 

A Village Institution

At the 2022 Annual Parish Meeting, the St Lawrence Electoral Roll was declared as comprising some fifty persons – not a large number considering the general regard in which the Church is held by those residing in the village.

As an architectural feature and landmark the church is an integral part of Oxhill – indeed the activities that take place there, be they the weekly services or less frequent christenings, weddings, and funerals, are part of village life. Occasional secular / fund raising events such as the Platinum Jubilee, Made in Oxhill (Saturday 23rd / Sunday 24th November this year), scarecrow weekends and lamb and curry lunches bring villagers together to enjoy one another's company. Oxhill is particularly known for its bakers of cakes and cooks who rise to every occasion and help give Oxhill its unique character.

If you've not been inside St Lawrence's recently, drop in and enjoy a few moments' tranquillity in this special place. Admire the beautiful flower arrangements therein and delight in the wildflowers to the rear of the



church. So many more people play a part in keeping the church and the grounds in good order – from maintaining the flowerbeds by the porch, polishing the brass, to winding the clock. The Parochial Church Council feels itself so lucky to have the involvement of so many people who are not necessarily regular church goers but who are willing to give of their time to support its activities.

There are plans afoot and, indeed, already drawn up to make St Lawrence even more of a community hub by developing the rear of the church as an activity space with kitchen and loo. Any offers of help to be clerk of works or otherwise oversee this project would be most welcome. The fabric of the church is in relatively good order by virtue of planned maintenance over the years, but, as with every other aspect of life at present, this comes at a cost. This article is written to promote the concept of *Parish Giving* whereby villagers who perhaps cannot spare time but by means of a regular monthly monetary donation can

support in a material sense the ongoing life of the building's fabric and its place in the community.

Working with Shipston Home Nursing

Oxhill Cooks has been rather absent for the last couple of months due to time constraints caused by all the Jubilee planning, cooking and baking. As we are currently on holiday recovering from the Jubilee Celebrations, this month I bring you a recipe that we sampled at the weekend while visiting France for three of my nephews' confirmations — a very long church service but my French sister-in-law provided excellent food afterwards, including this cake. It is a delicious moist cake and very easy to make, she tells me. She served it without icing but I'm sure you could add some if you prefer. She uses a tin of chestnut purée that you can buy in most supermarkets.





GATEAU À LA CRÈME DE MARRON (CHESTNUT CAKE)

Ingredients

5 eggs 160 g caster sugar 200 g softened butter 200 g plain flour 2 tsp baking powder 500 g chestnut purée

1. Preheat the oven to 170 C and grease and base line a deep 8" round tin, or a 10-12" ring tin.

- 2. Separate the eggs and whisk the whites until stiff (as meringue, test by carefully turning the bowl upside down. They are stiff enough if they don't fall).
- 3. In a separate bowl, cream the egg yolks, sugar and softened butter until the mixture is soft and light. Using a mixer is best.
- 4. Add the flour, baking powder, chestnut purée and rum and mix well.
- 5. Finally, gently fold the egg whites into the mixture using a metal spoon until all incorporated.
- 6. Put the mixture into the prepared tin and bake for 20 minutes or until cooked. (Test to make sure that the mixture springs back when pressed lightly or a cocktail stick inserted into the middle of the cake comes out clean).







WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

They trees are all looking good but with a much reduced crop, the birds have not had all the cherries and some are now ripening. A positive to the reduced crop of apples is that there is no need to supplement the natural June Drop. There will be pears, plums, greengages and damsons too so hope we have good ripening weather from now on.

The fruit cage is up protecting the red and white currants which get stripped very rapidly if the blackbirds have their way! The rest of the soft fruit is coming on well but like the trees with reduced crops compared to last year.

Last year we did have a pyramid orchid bloom in early July but to date it has not put in an appearance but there are large areas of grass with wild flowers.

WASTE COLLECTION

The Stratford upon Avon waste collection schedule is changing as of August 1st. You may have noticed a food waste bin delivered to your property. Below is information concerning the changes.



GARDEN WASTE UPDATE

We have sold over 39,000 permits (as at 13/04/2022) and are on target to reach last year's level of 49,000 permits sold which would raise around £2m and is used to subsidise and offset the increased waste collection costs that we are facing now and, in the future, plus improve existing waste services. From the 1st August food waste must not be put in the green bin, please use the food caddies. This will allow the garden waste to be treated at lower temperatures, saving energy.

MRF (MATERIAL RECYCLING FACILITY)

The new material recycling centre, currently under construction just outside Coventry City Centre) will be fully operational by October of next year, three months later than planned due to delays in supplies of cement and other materials. It will be the most advanced facility in Europe, if not the world, and is a joint venture between eight local authorities (the five Warwickshire district councils, Coventry, Solihull, and Walsall. It will be able to process, amongst other things, the plastic film that no one else can deal with plus all the usual waste you put in your blue bin such as card, paper, glass etc. We already have companies wanting to take the recyclate when the facility opens as they recognise that the materials will be cleaner and can therefore be used without additional sorting and cleaning costs associated with other facilities. All "takers" of the recyclate will be UK based companies. Finally, the roof of the MRF is covered in photo voltaic cells and will be able to put electricity back into the grid at times whilst all the forklifts and vehicles that run around the site will be electric.

WASTE CONTRACT GENERALLY (THE 123+ SYSTEM)

The 123+ waste collection service is due to commence on 1 August 2022. You may wonder why we are changing the waste collection service and what 123+ stands for.

- 1 Weekly collection of food waste
- 2 Blue bin (recycled waste) every two weeks
- 3 Grey Bin (residual wase) every three weeks
- + A garden waste (green bin) subscription service

All green bin and food waste will be sent to a bio digester plant Northwick Power,
