Cakes may be dropped off at the Chapel from 1pm.



Many people in the village will have seen a young man renovating the White House on Main Street. Recently I sat down with Joey (Giosué Larucci) to ask him about his work on the house and his work as a profession artist. Below are extracts from the interview. ~ ed.



GIOSUÉ LARUCCI

I want to ask about your art, but first, you're tackling a house!

Yes, tackling a house is tricky, because you have no idea where to start. You just have to dive in the deep end. The first thing I did was rip out the kitchen.

What made you think you could do it? And what made your mother trust you?

I've done this sort of stuff ever since I could hold a screwdriver and a hammer. I enjoy it. I never grew up with computer games or anything else like that, because we couldn't afford it. I grew up with Lego. I honestly think that Lego and other construction toys are the best things you can give to young kids, because they give you problems that you've got to solve. It makes you think, how can I do this? You gain the confidence to just go for it. Half of doing houses are the skills involved in

doing it, and half of it is sheer courage. It takes a long time to build it up, to think I can do this.

Did you have to persuade your mother? Or did your mother approach you and say, "Son, can you do my house?"

No, it was the other way around. I said if there's a place that needs work, I can do it. We were buying a house in the middle of the pandemic and there wasn't much for sale. We found this place and we thought we'd go for it. We can have a bit of an adventure while we're doing it. I didn't really know how big a job it was going to be; you never do.

So, the first thing you did was rip out the kitchen?

We knew we were going to renovate everything, so there was nothing we were going to leave. Because as soon as you start leaving things, they start to go wrong, and you've put new stuff in, and it can cause all sorts of problems. We gave ourselves a blank canvas to start to make

it our own. The lack of budget is a huge part of this. You don't have to spend loads of money on people to do jobs, if you can learn how to do it yourself.

And how did you learn?

YouTube, all of its on YouTube. I've never been with a bricklayer, a builder, a carpenter or anything. But I did design technology at school and I like to think I'm quite creative with my hands. I like to do stuff outside most of the time, and I don't like being behind a computer screen. People think that's a bit odd for somebody of my age, but it's the way I am.

How old are you?

I'm 20.













Let's talk about your art, when did you start?

When I was a child. My mum was very persistent with me. When we went out to a coffee shop, I would always be drawing on the back of a napkin. Everywhere we went I was always drawing. At the age of five, I won an art competition to open the Swan Fountain in Stratford upon Avon. The competition was open to all students in the area. I went with a girl who won the category for senior schools. I was in primary school at the time. I pushed the button to turn on the fountain and it was in the newspaper. I thought it was the best thing I'd ever done.

My grandmother is an artist, so it's in the family. I first started drawing planes, trains and everything that boys draw. I used to draw small scenes, such as a building on fire and I would draw the fire engines and stuff, as any kid would. My primary school teacher in Year 2 was an artist as well and that was when I won the competition. So, it was a combination of all those events that came together. And that was the start.

When did you start to earn money?

Before my GCSCs I started doing small paintings. There were quite a few parents at my school who were very happy to spend 50 or 60 quid on a painting. Later I approached galleries but they said no, so I thought, right this is tricky. I haven't been to college; I was still doing an A level. However, I thought I've got paintings that people buy, because people have been buying them, so I'll give it a shot by myself.



I established my website in 2017. And I sold my first painting online within the first week for 250 pounds. Then suddenly the galleries wanted to take me on. One of my paintings sold in the second week of being on display in a gallery.

I took on more commissions from friends' moms and through word of mouth it just snowballed. I got to a position where people recognised me by my name. I held my first solo exhibition in the school hall when I was 16. I invited everybody I could think of; heads of schools, galleries, everybody, and to their credit a lot of them came.

I'm not a realist painter, I'm more impressionistic. I use oils all the time. I started in acrylics, as everybody does when they're learning. Acrylics are fine, but they are fundamentally just a liquid plastic and they dry in five minutes. So having something that you can work on for months on end that won't go dry is great. It's perfect for me, because I'm very fussy about my paintings. However, I've got more discipline now. I don't spend more than a week on a work.

I try to get out as much as possible and paint in the field. If you're trying to paint a painting that's depicting winter and you're cold when you're doing it, it makes you put blues, whites and dark browns in it, that you wouldn't necessarily put in if you're sat in a nice warm studio. I would strongly advise any artist to paint from life.

You advise artists go and paint outside, but you are also entrepreneurial.

I didn't set out to be an artist originally, I set out to make money as anybody does when they're 16, 17, and trying to pay the car insurance. I was painting pictures to go on people's

walls to earn money. Now I try to sell my art in as many ways as possible. I've got paintings that I've used hundreds of times, for posters, prints, jigsaw puzzles, bags and postcards done with the National Trust. I've got my stuff in as many places as I possibly can, because it spreads the word. And of course, if you've got a large number of people demanding paintings from you, you can then set your prices up. I've got a waiting list going to December next year of paintings that I've yet to do. Partly that's down to me doing the house.

I'm very lucky. I don't just accept it as the norm. I feel very privileged to be in the position that I am.

Your mum must be so proud of you.

She is very proud; she's been very supportive. She got me to where I am, so doing the house is just really to give something back. I thought, I know how to do these skills. Well, I don't really, but I can look them up and have a go. It's the opportunity of a lifetime, to do something like this, for somebody.

9.30pm: Gather for Jubilee Beacon Lighting Kirby Farm drive

- Oxhill's Beacon for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee is near the top of the hill up the Kirby Farm drive, by kind permission of Thomas Fox.
- Please walk up the hill if you are able as there is limited parking in the lay-bys just beyond the beacon reserved
 for the less physically able. It will take you 20 minutes from the church.
- Bring a torch as it will get dark!
- · Please listen to any instructions from the marshals.
- The beacon will be lit at 9.45pm and the Song of the Commonwealth will be sung by Oxhill Music Group at the same time.
- Please ensure you are visible when walking along the Tysoe Road to the Kirby Farm drive and walk on the right hand side to face oncoming traffic.
- After the beacon has been lit and we've admired the Tysoe Windmill beacon, torches will be lit and handed to
 one adult per family group to start the procession back to the Church.
- We will be walking alongside crops and must be mindful of the fire risk. Marshals will direct you on which side to walk, depending on the wind direction.
- There will be marshals with fire extinguishers and buckets of sand all the way down the drive and along the road to the Church.
- The Tysoe Road will be open to traffic, so take appropriate road safety measures.
- If you have any concerns or issues, please attract the immediate attention of the nearest marshal.
- The end of the procession is at the Church where all wax torches will be extinguished for safety.

SPEEDING IN OXHILL

This is a summary of the past and present actions of your Parish Council.

In 2016 a small group of residents were trained to take part in the Community Speed Camera operation monitoring Whatcote Rd and Green Lane. Some 3.8% of vehicles were over the 30mph limit which we believe to be an unrealistic result due to the various warning signs drivers were shown before we could do the measurements.

In 2020 following our further pleas for assistance in reducing the speeding in the village we were promised action by the police which never happened.

In 2021 we were advised that if more than 30% of traffic was over 35mph then we had a good case for better police action.

A community speed reduction package was then promised which resulted in various posters and car stickers. This proved ineffective for our purposes.

In order to provide better evidence, the parish council purchased a radar speed checking device which had also been purchased by various police authorities.

Covert speed recordings (Note: not vehicle identification recordings) were made between April and June 2021 located halfway along the straight part of Whatcote Road in the village. During a total of 185 minutes, a total of 118 cars and other vehicles were logged. Some 40 % of which were measured at 35mph plus and 9.3% were above 40mph. The fastest recorded was 55mph! Both uphill and downhill numbers were similar.

The Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership recently published a paper detailing measures it was taking to improve road safety. This large document seemed to major on the community speed camera operations which we had already tried without lasting effect in our village. It did, however, seem to encourage Vehicle Activated Signs (VA Signs) which previously had been dismissed as ineffective. Also, there was mention of meetings with the police to discuss speeding challenges.

As an interim measure, the PC bought 30mph waste bin stickers and these were provided for Whatcote Road and Green Lane households and we would ask that these still be displayed.

Whilst we await any further action from the Safety Partnership, we are now actively pursuing purchasing our own moveable VA Signs. This will necessitate the placement of two sign mounting poles; one on Green Lane and one on Whatcote Road. Whilst we have an approved installer ready we do require some formal advice as to their optimum positions.

This is now being sought through the local Highways, Police and Warwickshire road safety organisations.

Videos of dangerous driving can now be uploaded by the public to the Warwickshire police via a recent web site called Operation Snap. This can result in prosecutions and we may be able to take some advantage of this, particularly if getting approval for our VA Signs takes too long.

The national campaign to make 20mph the standard for most villages has been rejected by Warwickshire County Council, mainly due to the associated legal costs but may be actioned for individual villages. We will pursue this on Main Street where the current 30mph speed limit is obviously too fast.

Newer residents may wonder why we cannot do more to prevent speeding, as there are other measures like chicanes which are effective. This is because we are a 'dark' village without street lights. This seriously reduces the options for us.


