UNA HILL

Many of you will have heard by now that long-term Oxhill resident Una Hill died recently. Una was our great friend and next-door neighbour for 40 years. She moved to Meadow Cottage in Gilks Lane – which her father Jack Bishop previously owned - with her husband David 50 years ago, and died there peacefully with her daughter Laura and son-in-law Francois by her bedside. Meadow Cottage bears a sundial inscribed with 'This is the house that Jack built, David cared for and we loved'.

Prior to marrying, she had been an art teacher and book illustrator, and most notably designed the cover for Lynne Reid Banks's seminal novel 'The L-shaped Room'. Her skills and energy were put to good use in Oxhill, as she produced village postcards, made curtains for the village hall and as a long-standing Village Hall Committee member brought fun and flair to village events. In those days, dressing-up was de rigeur!

Una was renowned for her hospitality - we were frequent beneficiaries of it – and had a wide circle of friends who she would entertain with great generosity and frequency! On summer days she and David - often with Laura, Francois and her grandson Guillaume - would set up a fulsome lunch under the trees in their garden, and as soon as we heard the popping of a cork we would make our presence felt, knowing it would result in an



invitation to join them....In later years we had a habit of holding Sunday evening 'salons' where discussions ranged far and wide, majoring on literature and poetry. Una was well able to hold her own with her polymath husband, and we'll miss her intellect and sharp sense of humour

Gardening was another of Una's passions, and combining it with her artistic eye resulted in a classical English cottage setting. With a nod to her maiden name Bishop, she majored on purple plants to reference the colour of bishops' robes. She was highly delighted to be

complimented by 'Gardeners' Question Time' panellist Matthew Wilson,

on the occasion of Laura's and Francois' wedding reception.

Away from the village she loved travelling and acted as David's navigator on their many trips to France. They made frequent visits to the US where they had several friends, and latterly an extended family when Laura married François.


All who knew her will agree that she was unfailingly kind to both people and animals, and many waifs and strays of the four-legged kind were given succour at Meadow Cottage!

Thank you to Patrick and Verity O'Donnell for arranging the beacon and risk assessment. Thank you also to Mick and Barbara Shepard for their presence in case of First Aid needs. Thank you to Julia Stirman for sharing memories of her father and thank you to Iain Macpherson for reading the official tribute with such feeling. The words brought home the sacrifice of all those who were part of D-Day.

HOLLYWOOD COMES TO OXHILL

On Saturday 1st June, people walking in Alastair's field, past our house must have wondered what on earth was going on as shouts of 'Action', 'That's a wrap' and Silence, please' were heard coming from our garden. If they looked across, they would have seen Morna in a pretty summer's dress, shivering in the cold wind, whilst talking about Hanging Baskets to a young

man holding a camera with lights to make up for the grey day.

What were they doing? They were making a film about (Dr.) Hugh Rowse' invention that is a device for automatically watering Hanging Baskets without any electronics or timers. It is such a good idea that we have applied for a Patent and formed a company, called Autohydrate Ltd, on the strength of it. I say we and mean, Hugh, of course, plus Mike Sanderson from Tysoe and myself. Hugh has a few Patents in his name from his days with HRI (Horticultural Research Institute) in Wellesbourne, now part of Warwick University and Mike has been involved with a few successful start-ups, like 'What Three Words' and is an avid gardener.

Hugh started work on his idea during Covid as a way of passing time whilst completely aware that keeping Hanging Baskets watered



during weeks away and fortnights on holiday is a real challenge. He equipped his garden shed with a few simple tools and produced his first attempts, all of which worked to a greater or lesser degree and the modifications and improvements soon followed. About 10 were deployed in various people's gardens last year and they all worked and lasted the summer. We were all impressed with the reliability and positive feedback that we had from our gardening guinea pigs and we started the Patent Application process and formed the company.

Mike felt that the most effective way to try to interest some manufacturers would be to make a short film and send it to some of the prominent social media 'Influencers' and get them to promote the product. Well in Oxhill we are fortunate in having the king of Pantomimes, Iain Macpherson, who has a lot of film making experience and his lovely Daughter, Morna, who is a prominent designer and producer of animated creatures for the film industry and some useful acting experience. We mentioned the idea to Iain & Morna and they know camera operators, video editors and the like and so what we originally envisaged we would do using an I-Phone rapidly became a high-tech film set.

Despite the chilly wind and the noisy aircraft that were flying overhead (thank you Tony Wilde for delaying the mowing of your grass) we had a most enjoyable day with many a laugh to keep our spirits up. Morna joked that as a 'film-star' she had certain requirements that we had to meet. She told us that she only ate the left-hand half of halved yellow M&M's to keep her going and these were dutifully supplied, to much amusement of all concerned.

Our thanks go to Iain, Morna and all of their technicians for their very professional assistance with our film, I'll let you all know when it goes 'live' as us luvvies say.





DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING

On Saturdays 8th and 15th June, the Parish Council held defibrillator training sessions, the sessions were well attended with 31 villagers taking part. The sessions were informative, reassuring and enjoyable including clear instructions on CPR and how to use the defibrillator. With the opportunity to practice both and become familiar with both the procedures and how to use the equipment in the event of an emergency.

When an emergency occurs and you are faced with an unresponsive casualty, ring 999 the ambulance service will inform you of the code for the nearest defibrillator cabinet. CPR should be started immediately on finding the casualty and continued until the defibrillator is ready to use.

The defibrillator device will give you clear instructions on to use it and what to do. Once emergency services have arrived, they will take over any medical attention needed.

The village defibrillator is located outside the Peacock Inn.

I recently came across this cake when out with a good friend and it was so tasty that I just had to find a recipe to recreate it. In essence, it is an apple and date cake with a baked-on coconut topping. As is my wont, I used the lovely ladies of Knit and Natter as willing Guinea pigs and it seemed to go down well with them, although I wasn't happy with the topping: it didn't stick very well to the cake or taste as good as I would have liked. I have since adapted the topping recipe and it tastes much better. It is still liable to leave the cake a little on cutting but I don't think it detracts from the enjoyment. I have only made it with eating apples so far but will try it with cookers in the Autumn.



LUMBERJACK CAKE

Ingredients

Cake

2 apples weighing 350-400g, peeled, cored and finely chopped

150g dates, chopped

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

250ml boiling water

125g butter (at room temperature)

220g caster sugar

1 egg

225g plain flour

Coconut Topping

70 g butter 60ml cream (any type, or milk) 80g dark brown sugar 80ml maple syrup or golden syrup 150g desiccated coconut



- 1. Place chopped apples, dates and bicarbonate of soda in a bowl and pour the boiling water over them. Leave for 10 minutes.
- 2. While waiting, line a deep 9" square tin with baking parchment or use the lining paste featured in May's Oxhill News. Preheat the oven to 180C / 160C fan.
- 3. Beat the butter, caster sugar and egg together in a mixer until light and fluffy.
- 4. Stir in the apple and date mixture. It will seem incredibly sloppy to start with, but persist with stirring until it forms a uniform mixture. Add the flour and stir to combine thoroughly.
- 5. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and level the top.
- 6. Bake for 50 minutes until the cake springs back when lightly touched with a fingertip in the centre of the cake.
- 7. While baking, prepare the topping by placing butter, cream, sugar and syrup in a bowl and microwaving until dissolved. Then simmer for a couple of minutes. (You could use a saucepan if you prefer.) Now stir in the coconut.



- 8. When the cake is baked, remove from oven and spread the topping evenly over the cake. This requires a light touch with a small spatula. Return the topped cake to the oven and bake for a further 20 minutes until golden brown.
- 9. Remove from oven and allow cake to cool completely in its tin.




