REFUSE COLLECTIONS

The normal routine of bin collection will be disrupted during the next six weeks.

In December there will be normal Tuesday collections of the grey landfill bins on Tuesday 1st and Tuesday 14th and normal green and blue composting and recycling ones on Tuesday 7th and Tuesday 21st.

However the grey landfill collection due on Tuesday 29th will NOT occur then, but will happen on THURSDAY 31st instead.

In January there will be a green and blue collection on THURSDAY 7th (not Tuesday 5th) and a grey one on WEDNESDAY 13th (instead of Tuesday 12th).

We will get back to normal with green and blue collections on Tuesday 19th.

So that's nice and clear then, isn't it.

NATURE NOTES FOR DECEMBER

O Dirty December, Yet Christmas remember. This month keep thy body and head from cold; let thy kitchen be thine Apothecary, warm clothing thy Nurse, merry company thy keepers, and good hospitality thine Exercise. (Neve's Almanack, 1633)

As I write this the country is experiencing severe winds and rain that have had devastating results on land, buildings and people. Not only does it have a physical effect on some people, but it can affect our temperament. A wind from the north-east will cut us to the bone and make us bad tempered; a warm westerly bathes us in a blanket of warm air and induces a feeling of wellbeing. Apparently in southern France when the Mistral blows down from the north, the murder rate increases. Most cultures have names for particular winds. I can remember in 1968 a southerly wind knows as a 'blood rain' that brought sand from the Sahara and on 1 July people got up to find they had red cars and indeed red roofs on their houses. In Cumberland they have the feared easterly know as the Helm wind; in Cheshire it's a Whittle; in Cornwall a Waddy, and in Norfolk and Suffolk sudden winds are known as Rogers. The wind tantalises with its invisible power and in many beliefs it is the breath of God.

One group of birds that seem to relish and enjoy the wind are the Corvids or crow family. They seem to play and are like the youth of the bird world. They ride winds like surfers and work it like skateboarders, twisting, turning, jinxing, then doing abrupt stalls, dives and rolls, all the time shouting and 'laughing'. Have you ever heard a raven chuckle - it's a treat! But not everything is rosy in the world of Corvids. A week or two ago I was alerted by crows making a cacophony of noise, which had aggression and anger in it. It was coming from the field behind the Peacock car park. There were a lot of crows in the air circling and occasionally diving. When I looked over the hedge I could see a single crow pinned down on its back by several other crows and four or five other birds were lunging in, violently pecking at it - I could see feathers coming out. Had a 'Parliament' sentenced this bird to death? I have read and heard about this happening before. Anyway I interfered with nature by shouting and clapping my hands, and in a black cloud they all vanished, seemingly the victim as well. A couple of mornings later, and most mornings since then, I have noticed early in the morning a single large crow walking around the pub car park, obviously looking for morsels. I then noticed something odd about this crow - it has one white wing - was this the sentenced bird? And if so, was the white wing the reason? A mystery. I have been trying to get a photo of this bird, so far without success.

> So now is come our joyful feast Let every man be jolly Each room with ivy leaves is dressed And every post with holly Without the door, let sorrow lie, And if for cold, it hap to die, We'll bury it in a Christmas pie And evermore be merry

FOOTNOTE

I have been working at a house a couple of villages away - excellent garden for nuthatches - but the night before I was there the garden shed was emptied of mowers etc by thieves, so be extra vigilant over Christmas, and if you are going away, let your neighbours know and do not load your car up the night before you leave.

MATTERS DISCUSSED

Warwickshire Fire & Rescue Authority

Consultation documents for the proposed modernised service were discussed. From this information emergency response times to the village appear unchanged. The meeting agreed with the positive points raised and would return the questionnaire.

Planning

Application for extension to the front of "Feldon House" was returned with no objection. Permission had been received from SDC to remove old hedging and replace with new at "Stonecroft".

Community Emergency Plan

This had now been updated and all Parish Councillors were in receipt of a copy.

Age Concern

This organisation's aim is to assist older people to enjoy independent living for as long as possible and to this end provides a wide range of practical, care and information service. Some services are free whilst others are fee paying, for example:

VILLAGE HISTORY

The Cliftons Revisited

Since my article in the September Oxhill News showing photos of Arthur, Walter, and - as I thought - Walter's wife Amy Clifton, I have been contacted by Mrs Pat Pick, a cousin of Bill and Tom Heritage, who tells me that the lady on the sun parlour at Payn's House was in fact Ethel Clifton, Walter's sister, rather than his wife Amy. Pat Pick has happy memories of childhood visits to Uncle Walter and Aunt Amy, and has now shown me several old family photos of both Ethel and Amy, (if I may call them so), to clear up the confusion. (She has some views too of Payn's House showing Walter's productive and immaculate vegetable garden; I understand his pea sticks stood in strict precision!).

The lady shown in the Bowers photographs is clearly Ethel, who would still have been living at home with her parents, Arthur and Jane Clifton, at Payn's House in 1930. Mrs Pick's photo shows her on her wedding day, September 21st 1932, when, aged 39, she married John (Jack) Gilks, smallholder, 46, moving only a field's distance away to the house now called Laurel Cottage in Blackford Way. Jack was later to die tragically in an accident in 1962, aged 76, when, while doing some repair work to his house, he fell from his ladder. Bill Heritage tells me that he used to farm the fields across the Kineton Road from Whitehill, where there were then some farm buildings. He kept a few cows and pigs there, and he and Ethel would cycle up daily, carrying hot water in cans on their bicycles to wash the dairy utensils. People said you could set your clocks by them, even on a dark winter's morning. It was a hard and unremitting life - they saw little return for their labours, and had no holiday - but they were always happy and content. Their house was known as "Pickins Farm", but the name does not seem to have been much used, nor have any historic roots. I heard it used when I first came to the village in 1975, and when Ethel died in 1983, aged 90, her address was entered as "Pickins Farm, Oxhill" in the burial register. The name occurs nowhere else in village documents, and I wonder whether perhaps it had any connection with the fields that Jack Gilks had farmed, which were across the parish boundary in Pillerton Priors. I have randomly found a number of the Pickin family listed in Birmingham in the 1901 census. Could one of them have owned land in Pillerton perhaps? (A very long shot!)

Having established the identity of Ethel, it appears that Amy Clifton is not present in any of the Bowers photos after all. She and Walter lived then in Tysoe, and their daughter Dorothy would have been at school, so Amy had presumably stayed at home that day in 1930. Dorothy was their only child, and grew up to train as a nurse and work at a nursing home near Oxford. Tragically she was killed in 1950 aged 27, when riding pillion on a friend's motorbike, and her parents never recovered fully from their loss. The photo of Amy here shows her with Dorothy in about 1925 or 1926, when Dorothy was 3 or 4.

I met both Ethel and Amy in their later years. Ethel on one occasion, was accompanied by her neighbour in Blackford Way, Mrs Lizzie Cornes. She described

how, before marriage, they had lived across the lane from one another, she at Payn's House, and Lizzie, then Lizzie Taylor, at Fellows House. It was a pleasure to them that in old age - (Mrs Cornes having returned to Oxhill in widowhood) - they once again lived close to each other, this time not opposite but next door.

FROM SHIPSTON POLICE

Credit Card scam

Lancashire Police have advised us of a scam which is being worked well in their area at present. A person rings up purporting to be from a security section of a banking institute and is looking at unusual spending on your account. The caller already has your card details and name and address, but he is after your 3 digit security coded on the back of the card. He identifies himself and gives a badge ID number and a 6 digit reference number for you to quote and is quite willing to repeat the information. He gives details of an alleged transaction which is under $\pounds 500$ and a possible threshold limit. You deny any knowledge of this transaction and he states that he will authorise a credit of this amount to your card but needs certain information to check you are still in possession of the card and this includes the three digit number on the rear of the card. Armed with this information the caller then makes a transaction using your card details for the amount just specified and you later may receive a genuine call from your bank asking you about that transaction! Very complex, but it seems to work. Banks will not ask you for your 3 digit PIN code on the rear of the card. They know what it is as they issued you with the card in the first place. BEWARE.

Burglary in Oxhill

Between the hours of 19:30 and 21:30 on the 4.11.09, offenders unknown have gained entry to an Oxhill flat by smashing the first floor window. Two oil paintings depicting the countryside dating from the 17th to 18th century were taken. The offenders then proceeded to disconnect the water pipes and block the drains with cushions, causing water to run throughout the flat and leak into the garage below. Temporary closure of Shipston Police station

The police station will be closed to the public for the duration of the building work and your Safer Neighbourhood team will temporarily be based at Wellesbourne. However we wish to reassure you that the policing cover across the area will not be compromised and that the Shipston SNT will still be operating within the area.
