# NOTES OF OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 12<sup>th</sup> NOVEMBER 2013 AT 8.00 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore, was attended by Parish Councillors Carol Taylor, David Hill, Tom Heritage and Brian Badger.

## **MATTERS DISCUSSED**

### **Planning**

Oxhill PC supported Tysoe's objection to the proposed 80 dwelling development on the Oxhill Road. The two concerns being extra through traffic and potential increase in flooding.

Planning permission has been granted for (i) detached garage and room over at Merrilees, (ii) retention of single storey wooden building and porch for Farm Shop at Red Horse, (iii) Sheep housing – agricultural building at Church Farm. Planning permission refused for replacement garage at The Old Church House. Planning applications withdrawn at (i) Applegrove - demolition of one dwelling and construction of two, (ii) proposed 2-storey extension and lean-to 3 Peacock Cottages.

Planning application were returned with no objection for (i) retail unit with office space and staff facilities, car parking and amended vehicular access at Windmill Farm, (ii) single storey rear extension to form kitchen and garden room at Morningside, (iii) first floor side extension and new porch at Hillox. Planning application to demolish brick/stone boundary wall at Merrilees returned that this wall be replaced with either hornton stone or matching brick.

### **Sewer Network – Whatcote Road**

Investigatons have been concluded and Severn Trent are planning to replace the public sewers along Whatcote Road. They will endeavour to minimise disruption where possible and update residents as they get closer to the proposal construction date.

### **Electoral Review- Stratford-on-Avon**

It is proposed that SDC have 36 councillors instead of the 53 at present with the presumption in favour of a single member warding pattern. A notice is posted on the notice board and if you are interested in this you can go to website, [consultation.lgbce.org.uk](http://consultation.lgbce.org.uk) and give your comments.

## COMPTON VERNEY – EXHIBITIONS November to December

### **Curious Beasts: Animal Prints from the British Museum** 5 October – 15 December

An exhibition of the beautiful and bizarre imagery found in prints of the 15th to the early 19th centuries in the British Museum's collection, featuring prints by well-known artists including Albrecht Dürer, Francisco de Goya and George Stubbs, alongside lesser known and rarely seen treasures. The exhibition includes works created through a variety of different printmaking processes including engraving, woodcut, mezzotint, etching and drypoint. Visitors to the exhibition on Tuesdays and Saturdays will be able to find out about these processes through a demonstration by printer in residence Kate Da'Casto from Leicester Print Workshop before having a go at printmaking themselves.

### **A Fantastical Animal Alphabet** 5 October – 15 December

This exhibition accompanies Curious Beasts: Animal Prints from the British Museum and draws inspiration from Enid Marx's (Marco) Animal Alphabet creating A Fantastical Animal Alphabet of new original prints.
