NATURE NOTES FOR JUNE

This is the month of Roses, and their beauty and fragrance conjure up again many in poetical creation which memory had buried. This is the season to wander into the fields and woods, with a volume of sterling poetry for companionship, and compare the descriptive passages with the objects that lie around. We never enjoy reading portions of Spenser's Faery Queen so much as when among the great green trees in summer.

Chambers Book of Days.

..... two buzzards are sitting on fence posts six metres apart. They have been feeding together on a rabbit carcase. They sit, preen, clean and air their feathers. Completely ignoring the buzzards is a group of four or five crows on the ground squabbling about something. A raven flies over chortling to himself in that wonderful deep throaty croak and the crows all immediately take off to "escort" him out of their territory. As this is happening my attention is caught by a sound – pee-wit pee-wit, the unmistakable call of a lapwing. No more than 100 metres away a pair of lapwings are putting on a most fantastic aerial display – climbing and climbing then suddenly changing into a twisting, rolling dive and then an upward twist and a flurry of rapid buzzing wing beats, then repeating the whole thing again, very close together as if in synchronised flying. The Anglo-Saxons used the word hleapewince which has the quite beautiful meaning of a "leap with a waver in it" which conveys so well the tremulous power of the lapwing's flight, and this is the origin of the bird's name. Within minutes they are on the ground, the female standing quietly, almost aloof, while the male displays by making nest scrapes, breast touching the ground, head going from side to side, and rear end tilted up to the heaven showing off his striking rust-coloured under tail, the iridescent green on his wings glistening in the morning sunlight, then standing upright and stretching his head up with a nodding motion, showing off his magnificent long head crest, then running forward and starting the whole procedure again. Meanwhile to my left a fat song thrush fledgling is in the middle of the lawn demanding food, the parents hurriedly flying backwards and forwards bringing their offspring tasty morsels. As I stand watching all this, just behind me is a old stone trough filled with plants where I have noticed a pied wagtail, beak full of grubs, patiently waiting on a nearby wall. I carefully and gently separate and look through the plants and there it is, packed tightly in amongst the leaves and the base of the plants, a nest with five baby wagtails. I quickly move away, allowing the adults to carry on their task of rearing their chicks.

This entire episode lasted no more than ten minutes. I was working at a farmhouse a couple of miles from Oxhill. The lapwings were on a field of old stubble next to the house. The owner of the house phoned the farmer, and hopefully the field will not be ploughed until the lapwings have nested and reared their young. She was also about to replant the trough, so this also has been put on hold.

Many thanks to the four people who have provisionally volunteered to join the Parish Biodiversity Group. I will call our first meeting shortly, and if anyone else would like to join, please contact me. As things progress, I will keep the village informed via these nature notes.

Sea travel to foreign parts reckoned to be safe after midsummer; guard against sea-sickness and outlandish food. MATTERS DISCUSSED

Annual Parish Meeting held on 7th April

Only two people attend this meeting and there were no matter arising.

Finance

Accounts and Receipts & Payments Book for year ended 31 March 2009 was signed by the Chairman. Annual Return for audit for this period was presented with Bank Reconciliation, Notes to the Account and Variation to the Accounts and signed by the Chairman and Clerk. The Annual Governance Statement was also approved and signed. Accounts can be view at the Clerk's home during June.

A £150 honorarium, (including expenses) was accepted by the Clerk for the year ended 31 March 2009. Mandatory insurance cover of £317.03 would be paid. £345.71 had been paid to the Village Hall towards the cost of tiling the kitchen. 60% of the cost had been granted by Stratford District Council.

Theft of Plant - Tysoe

It is believed a lorry or low loader would have been used to remove the two items of plant which weighed some 2-3 tons in combined weight. Theft from Garden Sheds

A number of shed burglaries have recently occurred in the Butlers Marston, Tysoe and Ettington areas. Garden machinery and power tools are the most common items stolen and the Shipston SNT are urging the community to reassess their garden security. Please read below for ideas on how to keep your garden safe.

Check your boundary fences, walls and gates. Keep them in good repair as they do provide a useful barrier to the would-be thief. Consider the use of plant protection such as the thorny shrubs - Pyracantha, Berberis, etc.

Ensure that your household insurance policy covers theft from your garden and outbuildings.

Install outside security lighting, preferably from dusk until dawn. With sheds and other small buildings fit at least one heavy duty hasp and close shackle padlock plus strong hinges all with coach bolts bolted through the door and frame for extra strength.

Where possible, secure all the machinery/tools inside with a chain and padlock. Smaller items are not only often stolen, but regularly used to break into your house, or a neighbour's home or shed.

Fit any windows with a grille inside the shed.

A shed alarm can be obtained at a reasonable price.

Property mark all valuables such as lawnmowers, hedge trimmers and garden furniture. Post coding can be done with ultra violent marking pens, engraving, stamping or even paint. A SmartWater property marking kit is another product that can be used to act as a deterrent to theft/burglary offences - www.smartwater.com for details.

VILLAGE HALL AGM

The Village Hall AGM was held on 28th April.

John McKail, the Treasurer reported to the meeting that the year had been very profitable. The functions held throughout the year had all been well attended and have raised in excess of two and a half thousand pounds. The Village Hall has also received grants of over f_1 10,000.

Brian Badger, the Chairman, then gave his report to the meeting. He said that the profits made from the functions together with the grants that were awarded to the hall have made it possible to carry out several necessary maintenance jobs. The beam in the main hall has been repaired and the hall has been completely redecorated. Some major improvements have also been made to the hall. A new front and back door have been fitted and soft lighting installed. Stratford District Council and Oxhill Parish Council have together funded the fitting of wall tiles in the kitchen and toilets which now look very smart and with a £5,000 grant from the Heart of England Foundation a new damp proofing system has been installed. The new drinks cooler in the bar and new fridge in the kitchen have put an end to warm beer and white wine!

Brian thanked the Committee and their families for all the hard work they have put in throughout the year. He said he wanted to give a special thank you to those villagers who are not on the Committee but who have also worked hard to make this year so successful. He specifically named Sue Robbins who continues to look after the garden and Dot Richards who helps to clean the village hall.

Open letter to the Residents of the Shipston area concerning the temporary closure of Shipston Police Station

Dear Resident

The Chief Constable and the Police authority remain committed to neighbourhood policing and to retaining a modern and fit for purpose police station in Shipston on Stour. As you may be aware a major refurbishment of the existing police station is due to take place this year and we are hopeful that it will be completed within a three-month time scale. We anticipate that the work will start no later than July 2009. The police station will be closed to the public for the duration of the building work and your Safer Neighbourhood team will temporarily be based at Wellesbourne. The option of a time-staged refurbishment was considered but was discounted due to operational reasons and the significant additional use of public funds this would incur.

I am aware that this temporary closure may cause some concerns within the community and because of this I wish to reassure you that the policing cover across the area will not be compromised.

I am grateful to Shipston Town Council for the offer of alternative police accommodation within the town for the duration of the building work but we have had to decline this kind offer due to the prohibitive costs of providing secure computer links and ensuring the required level of security to protect sensitive information.

A plan has been put in place to ensure that the protection we offer and police cover provided is not compromised by this temporary closure. I have provided an extra regular Safer Neighbourhood team officer to Shipston, have sourced a mobile police station to be deployed locally and will be personally monitoring the temporary closure and any negative effects it may have locally.

Having seen the plans for the new Police station I am personally convinced that the short term loss of your Police Station is the right thing as it will provide a modern and fit for purpose Police Station in Shipston for the future and will ultimately allow us to provide better protection and a better service locally.
