Queen's Diamond Jubilee Report - May 2012

3rd - 4th June 2012

We're almost there!

It's been a long time in the planning, work started over a year ago, and now all we need is fine weather! I would like to thank the team of helpers who have been working hard since last September to make this weekend a success. They in turn have been

supported by you, the village, who have parted with deposits and paid for tickets well in advance enabling orders to be placed for all the facilities that will appear over the next few days.

So it is now over to you all to enjoy the programme of events that have been arranged and join in as much as possible and make it a memorable Diamond Jubilee Celebration.

Badges

You will shortly be receiving badges for the tickets purchased. They are your personal souvenir and must be worn at all times to access the event. Please ensure that your guests wear their badges so as to avoid embarrassment as we will monitor those on site and will be challenging those not recognised or not wearing badges. The event has not been advertised outside of the village and is in effect a private function mostly taking place on private land and those unidentified will be asked to leave.

So remember - no badge no food!

Security

Please be aware of strangers and do not be afraid to challenge them particularly in unexpected circumstances. If in doubt please contact one of the event stewards. Details of stewards will be included in your event programme and on notices around the site.

We have measures in place to ensure that our environs and all those attending the event remain safe and secure throughout the weekend.

Special Needs & Medical Emergency

Road Closure

Main Street will be closed completely to all traffic from 8am on Sunday morning until late, from 9:30am until at least midnight on Monday and on Tuesday from 9am until approximately 2pm.

Access will be maintained to all properties on Main Street at all times for emergencies but we would respectfully ask residents living between The Peacock, towards the Church as far as the junction with Back Lane, to remove cars from the street during the periods of closure.

This is particularly important on Sunday as tables for the Big Diamond Jubilee lunch will be installed from 9am. If you will need to use a vehicle parked in a garage or on a drive during Sunday please consider moving it elsewhere before we start erecting the tables.

Weather

This is one thing we are unable to control but we have powerful allies at work!

If the weather is inclement the event **will continue as planned** although some of the outside activities will be curtailed. The Big Diamond Jubilee Lunch will go ahead but will be split between the marquee and the Old Chapel. The Pig Roast and the live music will go ahead in the marquee on Sunday.

Art in the Chapel

The art class under the leadership of Barbara Kenny have been working on a theme of the Queen and diamond jubilee subjects this year. Their work will be on show throughout the weekend in the Old Chapel.

Catering and Drinks

You do not need to bring anything to the Big Diamond Jubilee Lunch. We have sufficient tables and chairs for everybody to sit down for lunch. The tables will be suitably decorated and disposable plates and cutlery will be provided. If you want to eat off your best dinner service you are free to bring it along at your own risk. If you want to bring your own cutlery please do so but you will remain responsible for it at all times.

You are free to bring drinks of your own choice to the lunch. Please bring your own drinking containers. We would prefer that glass is not used for obvious safety reasons.

The Peacock will provide a normal bar service throughout the event and will be offering specially brewed Diamond Jubilee celebration ales from the barn.

You are free to bring your own drinks for consumption at any events held in the marquee and within the field boundary. Other than the Big Diamond Jubilee Lunch, consumption of your own drink elsewhere will be discouraged. Clearly it will be unacceptable on the licensed premises of the Peacock Inn.

Programme of Events

All events and timings are subject to change without notice.

Sunday 3rd June

8am Build up breakfast at the Old Chapel – a breakfast briefing for stewards and muscle men who will help with lifting and shifting during the event. First job is to erect tables on Main Street for decoration to commence at 9:30am. Bacon and / or sausage rolls will be available. (That's a bribe!)

12 noon bells ring to announce the start of our celebrations and Church service which will start at 12:15pm. 1pm – dedication of OWLS Church Yard commemorative planting. Those gathered at Church will then process to Main Street for the 'Big Diamond Jubilee Lunch'.

Tables will not be reserved but obviously family groups will expect to sit together. One of the principle purposes of the Big Diamond Jubilee Lunch is to get communities to mix so please respect this objective and meet someone new! You are requested not to sit at a table until invited to do so!

Tables will be formed to accommodate 30 people. Serving commences at 1:45pm with a menu of ham, salmon, new potatoes and salads followed by a pudding. (Vegetarian options available). A table head will be appointed by the catering team and a ham will be carved at each table. Sides of salmon will also be delivered to the tables for serving.

A variety of field games mainly for the children will start at approximately 4pm, followed by 'Has Oxhill Got Talent?' home grown entertainment (approx 5:30pm).

Big Diamond Jubilee Quiz (New)

The evening will continue from approximately 7:30pm with the Big Diamond Jubilee Quiz. This will comprise general knowledge questions about the last 60 years, pictures, and music questions and interludes. Thanks to Adrian Marklow for agreeing to write the questions.

The quiz is free to enter and depending on demand will take place in the marquee or if there are only a limited number of entries, at the Peacock.

Please register your team of 4 on the day so that we know how many answer sheets to prepare and whether the marquee needs to be set up for the quiz.

Monday 4th June

Commencing at 2pm - The great red hobby horse races and best dressed competitions will be held in the field and the parade ring. We need lots of entrants to make this a success. Not racing? Children's field games will again be available from approximately 3:30pm. Afternoon teas will be available from the marquee from about 3pm until approx 4:30pm.

What is Family Water Volley Ball?

It's traditional in Oxhill or has become that way over the last few major events. Two teams of four hold bed sheets, one in each corner, on either side of a volley ball net. A water filled balloon is placed in the one team's sheet and they serve it over the net. The other team catch it in the sheet and toss it back. Simple! Otherwise its like volley ball! Starting about 4pm. Entries in advance preferred to Andy Buchanan on 688112.

Evening Entertainment

Presentation of prizes to winners for all the events will take place at approximately 6pm. From 6:30pm we will commence serving the pig roast. From 8pm we have live music with Pascal's Triangle. We will break at dusk (approximately 10:15pm) to launch 60 red, white and blue lanterns (subject to suitable weather conditions). Live music continues until midnight.

Tuesday 5th June

Clean up the site from 10am until finished. Retire to the pub garden for the Breakdown BBQ and paella pan in the garden of the Peacock. Food available but not included in the ticket price but wear your badges!

ROYAL CONNECTIONS

My story begins with a very cross 9 year old, my mother, who was selected to dance round a Maypole for the Coronation of Edward VII dressed as a poppy when she wanted so much to be a cornflower. Marguerites were the white flowers



I was 7 when George Vth died and was briefly succeeded by the uncrowned Edward VIII before George VI, his brother, was crowned in 1936. My mother and older brother and sister experienced this momentous occasion in the Mall. No TV then.

But I digress. I had just started my post as Occupational Therapist in January 1952, at the Warneford in Leamington Spa, when the King died the next month. I well remember that on the day of the funeral EVERYTHING stopped. I was on a bus going home when the driver and all passengers got out and stood silently in the road.

Then came the excited preparations for the coronation of his daughter Elizabeth, a young mother of only 27. So I was determined to follow tradition and be there to experience this special event at first hand.

A friend and I went by train to London to join crowds who thronged the city to see the spectacular decorations in The Mall. There were triumphal arches in gold and blue with enormous crowns suspended underneath, unfurled standards on the lamp posts, flags and bunting everywhere and banks of spectator stands.

We spent the night on the very hard floor of the Metal Box Co. head office, where my friend's fiancée worked. With so many other people squeezed in it was like a refugee camp. But not for long. At 4a.m. we set off to stake our claim for a good view in Whitehall at the entrance to Old Scotland Yard (Remember Whitehall 1212?). No one had tents and camping equipment in those days, we just jostled in the ever bulging happy crowd. It poured with rain but no one cared. Oh! the joy of policemen looking across the street at each other for there would be no trouble. Happy days!

The first excitement was the arrival of the dust carts to sweep the streets--- loud cheers--- official cars drove up and down and then newsboys circulated calling out the splendid news, rippling through the crowd, that Edmund Hillary and Tensing

Tensing had conquered Everest -----Much louder cheers. Then, with rising excitement, the jangle of harnesses and thrill of military bands starting far away and gradually nearing Trafalgar Square we could almost see the start of the procession of Presidents and Potentates, Kings and Princes resplendent in uniforms and National Costumes streaming past keeping dry in carriages. All that is except the 6ft2" Queen Salote of Tonga accompanied by a miniscule Indian dignitary in an open landau---- she must have been soaked!! We were. And then the crescendo roar as the State Coach came into view and our first sight of the young Queen and Prince Philip. (You have all read about the rest).

Many had curious shaped cardboard periscope things to see over peoples' heads and there was much clicking of box cameras and Baby Brownies and then she was gone, but not before reports by loud speakers of what subsequently happened when she arrived at the Abbey and the service relayed outside. Afterwards, damp but in high spirits we surged up the Mall, after the police, to see the balcony scene and fly past.

WHAT A DAY and then to the train in the small hours for work at 9a.m. next day Waiting for the 'bus in the Kenilworth Rd. I fell asleep on the pavement only to be rescued by the radiologist on his way to the Hospital, I was just so tired.

That was my Coronation story and I would not have missed the experience of being there for the world.



OXHILL GARDEN CLUB

On a cold wet April evening it wasn't hard to imagine how colourless the lives of the Elizabethan peasantry were. In contrast, Tamsin Rosewell gave the Garden Club an animated, enthusiastic insight into how richly coloured the original gardens, created by Robert Dudley at Kenilworth Castle, were. Greatly architectural, with large gaudy structures, the planting seems insignificant to modern gardeners. However, the gardens were created from continental pattern books, probably most inventive at the time. The statements in the gardens were symbolic, making personal political expressions as well as being sensual; exclusively fashioned just for the creator – a splendid ego trip for a very ambitious man's attempts to influence his queen.



Faster Broadband Connection

Balvinder Heran from Stratford District Council gave a presentation to the Parish Meeting, re the above. 10mb will be guaranteed in rural areas. Although funding is available from Broadband UK and DEFRA the District Council has to match pound for pound costs incurred. Lottery funding of £10,000 is available to parishes upon application and we agreed to apply. There is also a need to find out what the interest and up-take would be for this faster connection.
