NATURE NOTES FOR MAY

May, which should be gathered at or before sunrise, can be any kind of flowering greenery, although hawthorn (May-blossom), birch and rowan are the favourites, while sloe or blackthorn is an ill omen. To leave a branch of hawthorn at a friend's door is a luck-bringing compliment: but 'gifts' of other kinds of trees can be insulting:

Nut for a slut; plum for the glum

Bramble if she ramble; gorse for the whores

Fiach, Marburan, Croupy Crow, Corbie and Ralph are all colloquial names for the Raven. The other morning a very large corvid flew over my fence followed by three 'cawing' crows. It was just a fleeting glance, but I knew instantly that the first bird had been a Raven. I have written on several occasions about the "Idlicote Ravens", but one almost in my garden is very unusual. To my delight later that day Janet Gardner phoned me to say she had had a rather strange, very large black crow-like bird on her bird table! Was it a Raven? And then almost on cue some of the press announced a Raven Invasion. Apparently Ravens are coming back into counties all over the country. A pair nested last summer on the white cliffs of Dover, the first in over 100 years. This is a mighty bird, the largest of all the corvids; it is also one of the most powerful beasts of mythology and antiquity. The famous ornithologist R M Lockley wrote:

When I see our Ravens I have a feeling almost, that this land is not mine, but theirs. They have been here from time immemorial. They are, so to speak, indestructible, they pair for life, and when one of the pair dies, a young bird immediately steps in to fill the gap.

Facts and myths about Raven - 'Blind people who are kind to Ravens will regain their sight' - 'Noah sent a Raven out during the flood which went forth and fro until the waters were dried up from off the earth' - 'They say the souls of the unbaptised go into Ravens and wicked priests become Ravens when they die' - 'Ravens drop stones on predators that threaten their nests or young' - 'They make distress calls that lead foxes to deal animals, the foxes break the carcasses apart, so the birds can feast' - 'If the ten Ravens kept at the Tower of London ever leave, then the Kingdom will fall'.

To see one raven is luck, 'tis true

But it's certain misfortune to light upon two

And meeting with three is the devil

So there you are Janet, your one raven will bring you good luck!

Pauline took us through guidelines for harmony in the veggie garden and talked on the balance of friends and foes in the insect department, providing safe shelter and food for beneficial “friends” and improving the structure of soil to maintain these naturally.

I was heartened by her advice that untidiness is beneficial and she gave us advice on crop rotation and resistant varieties that could be applied to avoid diseases in the garden. The quiz was well thought out.

The project steering group is preparing a very detailed full application for funding from the Big Lottery. In particular, we are most grateful to Lord Northampton who has very kindly agreed to make land available for the orchard. The exact location has still to be finalised, but it is expected that the application for funding, which will include details of the land, will be submitted by mid-May.

SAVE SHIPSTON HOUSE

Shipston Town Management Partnership, with the support of a number of elected members of Shipston Town Council, are pressing Orbit Housing to think again about their plans to convert the historic Shipston House into seven apartments, a planning application for which is to go before Stratford District Council, shortly.

The house was built in 1830 under the Poor Law Union Act to serve as a Work House. In the past almost two hundred years it has served as a hospital, a home for the elderly, an annexe to Shipston High School and, most recently as office facilities for Renault Agriculture who were acquired by Claas. Claas have sold the whole site to Orbit Housing for a development of affordable homes, including the apartments in the house, itself.

Plans have been developed by the Management Partnership to return the building to community use.

The East Wing of the building is envisaged as being developed into a facility for young people, something that is sadly lacking in Shipston whilst the West Wing is seen as being a craft centre where local artisans can produce and sell their work.

The main house is seen as being used as a community base offering facilities for meetings, exhibitions, concerts and performances, with a number of small offices being made available to local businesses and residents on a minimal cost basis.

Speaking for the Partnership, its Chairman, Graham Williamson said "It is simply not acceptable that one of the last vestiges of Shipston's historic past should be lost to the community.

In the previous rejected planning application by Banner Homes, English Heritage, the Georgian Society and the conservation architect at Stratford District Council expressed considerable concerns that much of the historic nature and its place in 19th Century history would be lost were the building to be converted into apartments."

Within the building there are decorations and fittings that need to be restored. It is understood that Orbit's intention is simply to panel over them which means that in time, they will deteriorate.

Shipston Town Management Partnership are now seeking to gather the support of Shipston residents by organising a petition which will be sent to Orbit and to the District Council when comments on the planning application are considered and have started the considerable task of identifying how the funds for saving the building might be raised.

CAR PARKING

As an Oxhill resident living within a few yards of the Village Hall, I read with some disquiet the reminder that “the Car Park adjoining the Village Hall is intended solely for the use of persons attending Village Hall events”. In the ten years of my residency in Rouse Lane directly opposite the car park I have never been aware of any abuse of what I had always regarded as a very useful facility for the community at large. I have seldom, if ever, seen more than two ‘non Village Hall event’ vehicles left in the car park at any one time, day or night, and to say that “On occasions, people who are attending Village Hall events are unable to park close to the Hall for loading and unloading because of vehicles that have been left overnight” just cannot be true!

We are lucky in Oxhill that very few residents need to leave their cars on the road because their property is lacking parking space for the family’s motor vehicles. When I and my near neighbours have had visitors arrive in cars that we cannot accommodate on our driveways, rather than litter the roadway we have always used the sensible option of temporarily parking our own vehicle or, rarely, vehicles in the village car park - if necessary, but seldom, overnight. Our cars are known; in the unlikely event that they are a problem, let us know - face to face.

Without even thinking of it as a quid pro quo, and because the Village Hall is an integral and important part of our immediate community, we accept with good grace the occasional disturbance from functions and late night revellers, pick up litter, put up with event attendees parking on Main Street and causing traffic congestion, put out/return the dustbins if necessary, clear the notice board of out of date event flyers etc. etc. I would urge the Village Hall Committee to accept the very local goodwill that ensues from their continuing to allow the level of ‘casual’ usage of the car park that there has always been and which is never knowingly abused.
